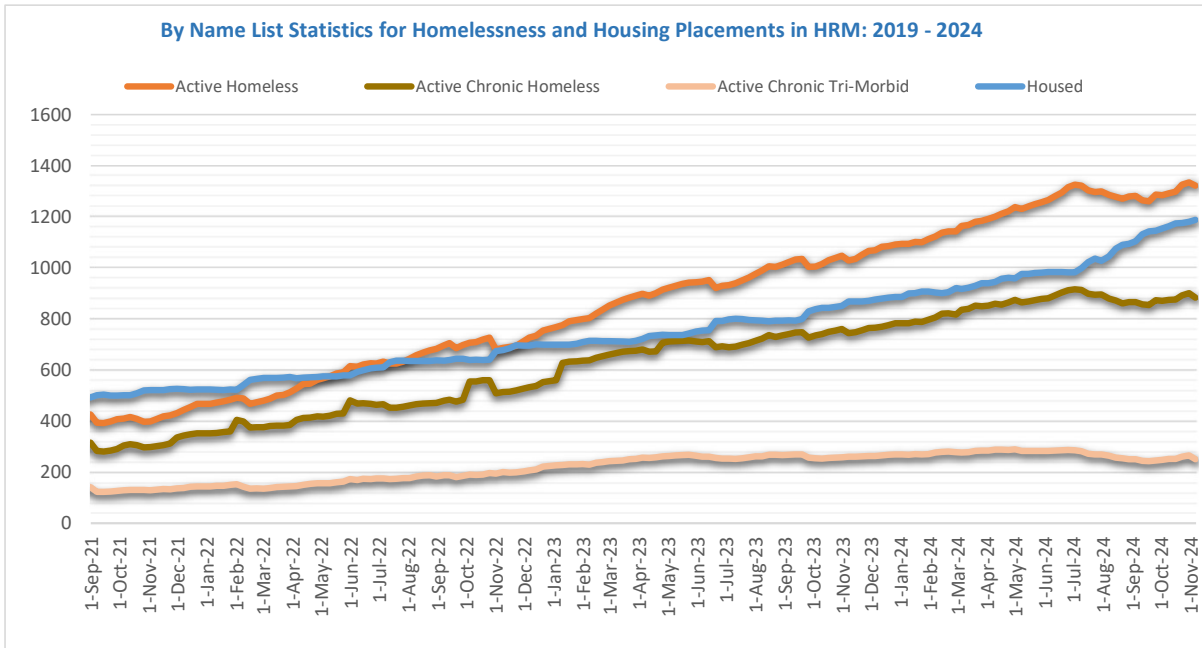

**Key numbers from this past week:**

- 19 individuals were added to the BNL for the first time
- 10 individuals and/or families were updated as "Housed"
- 2 individuals and/or families were updated as "Returned from Housed" to "Active"
- 23 individuals and/ or families were updated as "Inactive" from "Active"

**Updates are coming in from a variety of sources including agency staff and HIFIS data. Once again this week it is important to note that updates that were received from agency staff may reflect changes that have occurred over several weeks but that were only reported this week. We are continuing to work with all partners to maintain the most up-to-date information for everyone on the BNL.**

Note: +/positive numbers identify that more people entered homelessness since the last report and -/negative numbers identify that fewer people are experiencing homelessness (become "Inactive" or "Housed")



**Note:** The impact of few affordable housing options - with only 2.4% of the rental options affordable to households in the lowest 20% of income distribution, lowest vacancy rate of 1% and higher levels of rental arrears - correlates with marked increases to the number of households experiencing homelessness in 2023 and onward. (CMHC Rental Market Report, 2023)
